Always be Training Your Replacement

Several years at General Assembly I had an opportunity to attend a Berry Street Lecture about leadership in our Unitarian Universalist movement. The presenters had gotten their first taste of leadership in the youth movement, and had come to all of us ministers and future ministers to discuss what they had learned about organizing through UU youth programs.

Their message felt especially relevant as Elandria Williams and Barb Greve were both serving as the Unitarian Universalist Association's co-moderators. Elandria and Barb were both strikingly young to be holding these positions of high authority and responsibility. And they had both also begun their journey of lay leadership in Unitarian Universalism as youth as well, learning many of the same lessons that I would hear at the Berry Street Lecture.

And now I'm going to pass this lesson on to you all, but rather than make you listen to an entire lecture for it, I will sum it up in five words!

Always Be Training Your Replacement

This is as much of an attitude or an awareness more than it is anything else. It doesn't mean you need to formally recruit anyone to be "in training" for the work that you're doing right now. Far from it, actually. What it means is inviting someone to join you in your work, and to show them things you're doing that work for you.

The reason why this was so important for the youth movement was that youth only have four years in high school before they're moving on to the next thing. This means that they literally cannot get away with waiting to find their next replacement. From day one, a youth leader is looking for the next, slightly younger person, to take under their wing, so that when it comes time to find the next round of leaders, there are many already prepared to take up the mantle.

So today's newsletter article is an invitation:

If you're already leading, look around you and see who you can invite to work alongside you. You don't need to ask them to be your replacement, but you absolutely can teach and share knowledge as you do this work together.

If you're not leading yet, take a close look at what you're doing. Because in this context Greeting and Making Coffee is leadership too. Because it's something you can teach someone else how to do. Just a simple invitation to join in the fun, work by your side for that particular Sunday morning. "Good morning friend! I'm here handing out bulletins and helping people get oriented, you want to hang out with me and do it together?"

And if you're really not leading yet, then this might be a great chance to "manage up." To approach someone doing a job you're interested in and asking if you can help.

Many hands make light work is a cliché because it's true. There's a unique kind of satisfaction that comes from bringing others into our circle. So let's do it!
