UUA Presidential Nominee

"Our most basic teaching is that every one of us is worthy, that none of us can be made less than the greater love that calls us into being" -Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt

While we have spent a lot of our attention on the Proposed Article 2 Revisions this year that will be voted on at General Assembly, this year's General Assembly is an important year for another reason. This year we elect a new President of the Unitarian Universalist Association.

The UUA Presidency is a six-year term, position and for the last six years this position has been held by Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray. According to the UUA's website, "The President of the Unitarian Universalist Association is the primary public and spiritual leader of Unitarian Universalism, as well as the UUA's Chief Executive Officer. They are tasked with helping to lead our Association on a path to Beloved Community, in which people of diverse backgrounds, identities and theological beliefs can thrive."

Throughout 2022 the Presidential Search Committee (composed of 5 elected positions and 2 Board-appointed positions) sought and reviewed applications for the position, and in the Fall submitted their two candidates for the Presidency. This process is all outlined in the UUA's bylaws.

According to the UUA's press release about this round's process, "At the conclusion of its process, the PSC unanimously nominated two exceptionally qualified leaders to be candidates for President. One of those nominees declined the nomination. Once the nominations were made, the committee determined that the only fair and appropriate course of action was to move forward with the nomination of Rev. Dr. Betancourt, rather than reopening the application process. The PSC members respect the decision of the nominee who withdrew, and will continue to honor their privacy, as was done throughout the interview process."

Nomination by this Presidential Search Committee is only one way to become a UUA Presidential Candidate. Petition candidacy is also an option that any member of a UU congregation can engage in if they wish. But this year's process did not offer us any petition candidates.

So, instead, Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt is running for UUA President unopposed.

While this is an unusual development, everything that I know about her and have read about her supports the notion that she will lead us well. Her platform of Communal Care, Collaborative Leadership, and Facing the Unknown Together resonates with the kinds of support that I feel like I need as a Unitarian Universalist in this new century. I was privileged to participate in a workshop that she led on Unitarian Universalist Liberation Theology at our last General Assembly. One of the questions that she asked us that day has stuck with me all year: "Who are you accountable to in your work?" As a parent who feels threats coming at my child from potential environmental collapse, a rise in gun violence and facism, and legislation that tries to frame my efforts to support transgender kids as child abuse, the answer that came to my mind immediately in this reflective question is that it is our next generation that I am accountable to in the work of our shared ministry: to make sure they have a world left to live in, and a world where they can thrive. It is exciting to me to potentially be led by someone who is inviting us to this sort of reflection.

If Rev. Dr. Bentacourt was not the only nominee, I would not be using this platform to speak of my admiration for her train of thought so openly. But since she is running unopposed, I thought you all might be interested to hear about who our nominee is and what I think about her.

Topic will be the Licensee Performance Review of Nuclear Fuel Services which research has determined has poisoned 95 miles of the Nolichucky River.
