Path to Membership Classes


There are two dates for classes this fall, Sunday, September 9 and October 14, from 12.30PM – 2:00PM. You need only attend one class.

First Impressions

My first Sunday at a Unitarian Universalist Church was a Water Communion service over a decade ago at my home church: the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Bay County. Jayon and I had decided that we needed community, but that this time around we could actually search for one that aligned with our values and our theology. (or in Jayon's case, his lack of theology!) Getting out of the car, full of hope, we heard a loud and friendly voice call out "Hello young people!" A tall, smiling black woman, about our age, was waving in our direction.

She showed us inside and helped us find a seat before she ran off to attend to another responsibility. I started thumbing through the hymnal to see if this place



By the time we got to the Water Communion portion of the service I had already decided that Unitarian Universalism was my new path, and that little building tucked amongst the trees was my new spiritual home. That tall smiling black woman has been our best friend for years now, and we are godparents to each other's children. The gray-haired lady taking great risks with the congregation's hymnals sent this church a little bit of money to help support my internship. This one Sunday opened doors to relationships that would change my life dramatically, and still are.

What would have happened to my life's trajectory if Jayon and I had been greeted with indifference rather than warmth? See the thing is, that neither of those people were the church's official greeter that morning, they just saw someone who needed to be welcomed and did it. Every Sunday we have new people come through our doors. Maybe they're a future religious education teacher, or social justice chair, or Board President. But we'll never know unless we let them know that they belong here. I challenge you, sometime this month, to find someone with a write-in nametag sitting in these chairs and introduce yourself, welcome them, and invite them to lunch after the service. Who knows what kind of impact your first impression might make?

ETSU Chorale to Perform September 23rd!

We are excited to present the ETSU Chorale under the direction of Dr. Matthew Potterton again this year at service Sunday, September 23rd.

Dr. Potterton will be asking for a free will offering to assist in fundraising efforts. Please see this short explanation from Dr. Potterton:

The Chorale is raising money to participate in one of the world's oldest choir competitions in Llangollen Wales. We will compete against choirs from all over the world hoping to



bring back top prizes. The cost is going to be about \$2700 a student and we are fundraising to help get everyone to go. Trips like these are life changing. As a college student, my choir participated in this competition and I remember socializing with choirs from all over the world. One that we really befriended was from Iran. At the time, our government's relations with Iran were even worse than they are now. But no one from our group or their group cared about that. We sang together and socialized together in peace. I can't wait to give my students this experience.

White Supremacy Teach-ins are Back!

Last spring we learned to recognize the characteristics of white supremacy culture and how it affects the everyday rights and privileges of our fellow humans of color. This fall we will explore how we can deliberately reshape our actions and attitudes to help dismantle this rigged system.

On September 23 local activist Kenneth Bonner will offer a workshop re: engaging communities in changing the face of social justice.

And on October 28 we will wrap up our series and commit to action.


Welcome from Music Program Director, Michael Luchtan

Hello future friends in music! I am excited and honored to be taking on the role of Music Program Director at Holston Valley Unitarian Universalist Church. As the weeks go by, I hope to learn more about individual members of the congregation and the role that music plays in your life. In the meantime, here is a little bit about myself. I began playing music at a young age, but didn't dedicate myself to the art until after I finished college. I have always sung, but my instrumental focus evolved from saxophone to guitar to piano, and my artistic focus from songwriting, recording, and performing to composing and arranging. For me, music has been a never-ending journey of discovery and a joy to play multiplied when shared with others. As Music Program Director I will be taking care of the nuts and bolts that result in the presentation of a quality, collaborative musical program every Sunday but I also hope that I can share my genuine love for music by creating opportunities for members of this community to partake in the joy of music, whether it be by sharing their musical gifts during service, making music communally with the choir and congregation, or being the happy recipient of various quality musical programming. I am hopeful that my tenure in this position will enrich the musical life of this congregation by promoting music as a means for jouissance, self-actualization, social cohesion, communal joy, and social justice.

I just finished a Masters degree in Appalachian Studies at ETSU. My thesis was an ethnographic case study of a musical community in Catalonia that plays bluegrass and old-time music. My work was focused on the characteristics of communities that appear around musical styles and why certain communities flourish. I will need your help to make this musical community grow and flourish. Communities are fostered by the people who give unselfishly of themselves to make the community better. Free Presentation Introducing Taoism's Approach to Death September 15, 2018 1:00-3:00 p.m.

The Appalachian Dharma & Meditation Center (ADMC) is offering a free presentation Saturday, September 15, introducing Taoism through the universal problem of death and dying and the fear often associated with it. Taoism is an ancient philosophical and religious tradition from China that has some historic affinities with Buddhism. The event is free and open to anyone interested in or just curious about Taoism. Popular Western understandings of Taoism are frequently limited to tai chi exercise classes, associating the "Tao" with "the force" from the Star Wars movies, that "yin-yang" symbol or a casual "go with the flow" approach to life. This presentation will introduce Taoist principles focusing on the common human concern of death and dying. The goal of this presentation on ancient Taoism offers a unique perspective and valuable insights that can be relevantly applied to life today regardless of one's religious or philosophical affiliation.

Intro to Taoism

The presenter is Gary F. Daught, an academic librarian and former Mennonite Church minister who lives in Johnson City. He has been studying Taoist philosophy for several years. The session is free of charge.

Original Caretakers Ceremonial Visit

As our friends in Northeast TN, we want to extend a VERY SPECIAL Invitation to attend the Original Caretakers Ceremonial Visit at the Oracle Campus in Independence, Virginia.

This once-in-a-lifetime event is co-sponsored by the United Nations and numerous NGOs.

Briefly, Kogi Mamos from Colombia and Otomi Shamans from Mexico are coming to North America - for the first time - and The Oracle Institute / Peace Pentagon is hosting the Virginia segment of the visit. While in Virginia, the Elders will visit the New River (oldest river in the western hemisphere) and Mt. Rogers (highest peak in Virginia).

The Elders will then travel to sacred sites in Colorado and New Mexico, and the visit will culminate in San Francisco, California, where the Elders will lead the Opening Ceremony at the Global Climate Action Summit. We (Noel & Bob) are honored to be hosting the delegation's overnight stay at Sunrise Ranch (in LOVEland, CO), where are summer residents.

You can join the Kogi and Otomi Elders in Virginia for TWO PUBLIC events:

- On Wednesday, September 5, the Elders will perform ceremony at Mt. Rogers - the requested donation for this event is \$50.
- On Thursday, September 6, Oracle is hosting a reception that will include the Elders performing a Medicine Wheel Ceremony, catered dinner, and music by Wayne Henderson – tickets are \$150 (\$200 for two tickets).
