Our work around our Principles and Values

In November I shared with you how the Unitarian Universalist Association is considering revisions to Article II of our bylaws, which includes the listing of both our Principles and our Sources, and is suggesting seven values instead.

This month I want to offer you an update on what that Revisions team has done, tell you what we have planned for the winter and spring around this work as a local congregation, and put it all together in a timeline

The work of the Article II Commission

In November the Article II Commission had a series of feedback sessions where they received feedback on their proposed revisions from hundreds of interested Unitarian Universalists: both laypeople and clergy alike. These sessions were open to anyone who wanted to attend them, and links to those sessions were provided in our November newsletter.

In December the Article II Commission reviewed the feedback from the session and gathered from feedback forms. From that work they offered a new round of revisions, which included changing one of the seven proposed values from "Evolution" to "Transformation." (See the attached image for all 7 values as they stand now). They will be sharing the updated proposal with the Unitarian Universalist Association Board soon as the next step in the process for bringing these proposed changes to General Assembly for a vote this summer.

For the specifics about how the proposed revisions will be brought to a vote, please see the timeline below.

How Is Our Congregation Looking at Article II?

Sunday, January 8th and Sunday, January 15th we are going to have a two-part sermon series on these Article II revisions. If this is something that interests you, I hope you can either come to the service or watch it on YouTube afterwards.

On Sunday March 5th after the service I will lead an interactive workshop where we get to explore these proposed revisions in more detail. And then we will have the same workshop online as a Zoom meeting the following Tuesday, March 7th.

Sometime this spring our Board of Directors will select our delegates for this summer's General Assembly. They will pay special attention to making sure that delegates are selected that are committed to representing us, their congregation, in this General Assembly vote.

After then workshops, we will have a feedback form that you can fill out to share your feedback directly with our General Assembly delegates

The Combined UUA & HVUUC timeline

Here's a list of what has already been done, and what will be done, related to these proposed changes:


- Fall 2020, UUA: Article II Study Commission Convened in response to bylaw stipulation that says we revisit and revise Article II every 15 years
- Spring 2021, UUA: Commission begins panels and surveys to gather input
- **General Assembly (June) 2021, UUA:** Article II study process introduced in a General Session and focus groups were held
- Fall 2021, UUA: Congregational resources developed and shared
- Winter/Spring 2021, UUA: Focus groups, individual interviews and surveys. Draft Language prepared
- General Assembly (June) 2022, UUA: Draft language shared. Focus groups and surveys.
- November 2022, HVUUC: Newsletter article outlines this revision proposal and congregation begins
 to think about it
- November 2022, UUA: Feedback sessions and surveys about drafts
- January 2023, HVUUC: Two part sermon series invites us to think more about these revisions
- January 2023, UUA: Draft submitted to UUA Board
- March 2023, HVUUC: Article II workshops on 3/5 and 3/7. Congregational feedback forms made available
- Spring 2023, HVUUC: Board selects General Assembly delegates and charge them to take on the responsibility of reviewing congregational feedback forms and representing the congregation
- May 2023, UUA: Mini-assembly for GA delegates is held prior to GA, delegates may offer amendments to the proposed revisions
- **General Assembly (June) 2023, UUA:** Delegates vote on final version with amendments made by Board and in Mini-assembly. The revisions will have to have a simple majority in this first GA vote to move forward for a year of contemplation and experimentation with the new Article II if it passes.
- **General Assembly (June) 2024, UUA:** Delegates vote again on final version approved during 2023 only if it passes in 2023. Requires a 2/3 majority vote for adoption. Any amendments proposed during this year would require a 3/4 majority for adoption.

 If either the 2023 or the 2024 vote fails, a similar proposal cannot be made or considered for two years.

This is a lot of information to process, which is why we are approaching it from so many different avenues: articles, sermons and workshops.

Thanks for sticking with us as we take a look at what these proposals are and what they might mean for us!

Religious Education News

Dear Ones.

It is officially the end of the "first semester" of Religious Education, post-COVID closure. We have had a lot of wins, and several challenges. I think it is important for the congregation to have an understanding of what HVUUC Religious Education has experienced since reopening in August.

Once we knew that the church was cleared to re-open in Spring of 2022, preparations began to launch RE for Fall (August). The first step in this was to offer listening circles for families so we knew what families were wanting out of Religious Education. What we heard was important to families:

- 1. OWL! Families wanted their children to participate in OWL. And since our OWL schedule was "off" due to COVID, we needed to offer multiple classes to try and catch the wide age groups.
- 2. Curricula that didn't require weekly attendance to benefit
- 3. Curricula that didn't require a lot of prep from volunteers
- 4. Emphasis on social justice issues

The RE Collaborative met to discuss what programming we could offer knowing these desires from families. We determined that we would offer Makerspaces for our K-5, a Tapestry of Faith curriculum focused on a social justice project for our Youth class, OWL for our 4-6th graders, and Stellar Sex Ed for our 9-12th graders. This was an enormous undertaking due to the amount of volunteers we would need.

We began recruiting for volunteers in the spring of 2022 knowing we would reopen in August. Recruitment was a challenge. Asking people to volunteer in RE during a pandemic with so many unknown variables was a hard ask. We adjusted to his challenge by requiring a minimum of 3 volunteers for our 2 K-5 classes instead of 4, and requiring the two classroom doors stay open so that the 3rd adult volunteer can float between the two classes.

Meeting the demand of offering sex education to our children and youth also presented a challenge. We had enough trained 4-6 grade OWL facilitators in our congregation, but did not have enough for our 9-12th grade level. To address the shortage of facilitators for the high school level, we collaborated with RISE: Healthy for Life. RISE trained several volunteers from our congregation in Stellar Sex Ed in late summer so that they could facilitate class during the fall.

Attendance for our Youth class has been very low since reopening. This is largely due to OWL and then Stellar Sex Ed running for these ages. However, we also have heard from the Youth that have been attending RE that they do not like the curriculum. They feel that it is dull and too much like school. Knowing this feedback, I connected with fellow DRE's and discovered a program created by Kathy Smith that ties board games to our principles. Kathy generously gifted me her curriculum, and we purchased half of the required board games. This curriculum will start in January!

Our big win since reopening was our very first Halloween Trunk or Treat! This was a wonderful day with 10 "trunks" volunteering and dozens of children dressed up, enjoying the brilliant and creative trunks. I was asked multiple times if we could do this every year. I hope to see the event happen in 2023! It is a fun activity that has very little volunteer overhead.

I celebrate all we have accomplished with Religious Education since we reopened. We have two thriving Adult RE classes with average attendance of 10-12 every week.

We have average attendance of 10 kids weekly in our K-5 Makerspace class. And we have held two different sex ed classes for our youth! I am proud of our community for all we have done in four months after being closed for 2 years.

December Treasury Report

As we end the second quarter of our 2022/2023 fiscal year, our income is \$2435 ahead of our spending thanks to your continued support and the conscientious use of our funds. The summary table of our finances for the second quarter is shown below.

This quarter has been very active. Our annual auction raised more than \$20,000. We also raised \$1,294 for Hunger First and \$790 for the Langston Center in Johnson City. We celebrated Rev. Sapp's call to be our minister with an installation service paid from the Search and Sabbatical Fund. Money from the Capital Repairs Fund was used to install gutters and gutter guards to help prevent flooding around the church at a cost of \$2,500.
