## A Path to Leadership

Happy New Year Holston Valley Unitarian Universalist Church! I hope we are moving into 2024 with a curiosity about what the new year might bring us.

January is the time of year when I start thinking about all the things that we need to do in preparation for the Annual Meeting that we have in the spring, where we do the business of the church. This means that I'm doing Staff Reviews, our Committee Chairs are putting together budget requests, our Stewardship team is gearing up for the pledge drive, and our Nominations Team is going to start thinking about who to nominate to fill open Board of Trustees positions for our next church year.

And this last point, and thinking about what it means to be a leader in our congregation, is what I want to talk to you about today. Board leadership is one of the most important ways you can serve our congregation. And attendance at our monthly Board meetings is just the tip of the iceberg. Each Trustee has an area of church life under their wing: Programs, Finance, Fellowship/Membership and Facilities all have a Trustee that connects with the committees under their area to offer support and oversight. (Social Justice is such a special part of our work here that the Vice-President watches out for them). The Trustees also live with one of the most important questions for our church, and that is "What is best for HVUUC?" This question is a challenge sometimes, as it's different from "What's best for me?" and even "What best supports the committees and interests that I have connected with personally before my time as a Trustee?" Holding this sort of space is one of the gifts that our leaders give us.

With this level of responsibility, we rightfully look to bring people onto the Board that already have leadership experience in the church. Last year we made it a point to make sure that our Trustee nominees are people who have served as a Committee Chair or the leader of a Task Group to make sure that they had already experienced some of the responsibilities of church leadership before finding themselves on the Board.

This means that in order for us to keep a healthy rotation of church leaders, I am always encouraging people to move one more rung up the ladder of leadership whenever they can. I'm going to share with you what I think that looks like. Take a look at this list and see if you can identify where you fit, and get curious about moving to the next step up.

**Visitor level** – Just started visiting/Casual friend of the church: Everyone starts somewhere and if you've just got your foot in the door here, we're just glad that you're here. Your main job is to learn more about us, and to think about if this is a community you want to be a part of. Take a religious education class, come to workshops, look into joining a small group, and when you're ready maybe you'll want to take a Path to Membership class.

**Member level** – You've taken Path to Membership and you've joined the church. Or maybe you've decided to not officially join the church for your own personal reasons but begin to volunteer and/or give in a way that shows a commitment to this community. Members who've not yet moved into leadership do volunteer but they are usually volunteering at things like coffee hours and work days, "just show up" kind of work. These things are so valuable and we're grateful for your low-pressure-but-showing-up support of our congregation.

Committee level – The commitment to actively involve yourself in the behind the scenes work of the church requires a slightly more significant commitment of your time and your mental and emotional energy, but this is where you really get the chance to start influencing how we live up to our Mission, Vision and Covenant in the church. Most committees meet either once a month or once every-othermonth and generally involve both deciding and doing the work of the church that falls under that commitment. There are so many places you can make a difference. Religious Education Collaborative, Caring Team, Membership Development, Social Justice Committee, Music Committee, Religious Services Committee, Facilities Committee are all active to various degrees. Communications and Finance are areas where we are currently looking for people to become involved where we don't currently have organized committees yet. If you want to help out on a committee, reach out to someone you know is already on there and see what it's like, or ask me who a committee chair is. I also see the sort of leadership that's required to be a Religious Education teacher or a Covenant Group facilitator as this level of responsibility. If you are at the Member Level maybe it's time to think about a Committee or similar work that you could engage in.

**Leader level** – All those great committees need chairs. This is where the level of responsibility and the power to effect positive change in the congregation begin to elevate exponentially. If you're already serving on a Committee, then see what you can do to make your presence, thoughts and action valuable to your committee chair. Some of our committee chairs have been doing this work forever and would probably enjoy the extra support from a co-chair, or from someone interested in being mentored into this work. There's also two other special committees at the church who take on a large level of responsibility, who I see as Leaders just from being on those committees. Those are the Committee on Ministry, that supports, advises and supervises my work as your minister. And the Nominations Committee, that cultivates and recruits our major leadership every year through the nominations process. Membership on these leading committees are so significant that you can't just volunteer for them, you have to be nominated.

**Board level** – If you've proven yourself as a Leader you may be asked to serve on the Board. I've already told you a bit about this sort of responsibility, and what a gift it is to the congregation to keep the Mission, Vision and Covenant of the church at the forefront of your mind. All I will say is this. If you are asked to serve, please consider saying "yes" this year, especially if you are a marginalized or under-represented identity.

**Mentor level** – After serving in positions of extreme responsibility in our church, the best thing you can do is share your wisdom with those who come after you, and enjoy taking a step back.

These little categories aren't official, they're just how I see them. But I hope they've helped you see how many volunteers and how much commitment we need in order to be a thriving church. And we ARE thriving. Membership has increased this year. We have had a visible impact on the Tri-Cities this year. We are developing a reputation both within these walls and outside of them for being "the church that loves everyone." And each of you, from Board level to newcomer walking in the door, have added to the rich diversity and community that is Holston Valley Unitarian Universalist Church. Thank you for your presence here. I hope I've encouraged you to think about what your relationship will be with us in this coming year, because we need you to be the best church we can be.

#### **Religious Trauma Workshop**

Are you curious about connections between religion and trauma? The evolving field of religious trauma is one that I have been exploring for the past six months, and my biggest take away so far is this – religious trauma is trauma. As such, there are a number of things we can do to raise awareness, combat stigma, and create spaces for healing. My own journey with religious trauma has spurred my curiosity in this field and sparked a desire to help our community as well.

Rev. Tiffany and I are developing a workshop to engage with anyone that has religious trauma, is curious about religious trauma, and would like to learn more about techniques for healing from religious trauma. The workshop will be a combination of didactic learning, small group sharing, and trauma related exercises. All are welcome who wish to explore, learn, and heal their own journey of religious trauma in a safe covenantal space.

The workshop will take place on Sunday, February 4, after the service beginning at 1 pm and ending at 3 pm. A light lunch will be provided beforehand. Please register before January 31, by emailing me at dre@hvuuc.org as spaces may be limited.

#### Treasurer Summary Report - Second Quarter 2023-2024

As we end the second quarter of our 2023/2024 fiscal year, our income is \$14,071 ahead of our spending thanks to your continued support and the conscientious use of our funds. The summary table of our finances for the second quarter is shown below.

Our auction in November raised more than \$21,000. Of this, \$5,000 was designated for running electricity to the covered deck, and the remainder was applied to the annual budget. Your generous donations for the fifth Sunday offering to Appalachian Peace Education Center raised over \$1,000.
