### July 2023 Newsletter: GA Report

Church Family, I have returned from Pittsburgh's General Assembly three days ago (as of the day I'm writing this, June 28th) and I am still marinating in the inspiring worship services, intriguing workshops, and the challenging but fulfilling work of governance for our Unitarian Universalist Association. There were several important votes that happened this year, and I want to let you know how they went.

### **Article 2 Revisions**

#### A Business Resolution on Divestment

A group of young adults proposed a Business Resolution about divesting Unitarian Universalist Association investments from fossil fuel companies. It was a broad and ambitious proposal which included divesting from any banking entity that did business with fossil fuels, and a full review of group funds to investigate if any of them contained fossil fuel investments. The Business Resolution also called for these divested funds, (around \$800,000 worth) be used to pay reparations.

The young adults behind this resolution made an impassioned plea and challenged us all to consider the impact of actually living our values. Many spoke first-hand of their experiences with the water defenders who protested pipelines being built through Indigenous lands.

Many progressive leaders of within our Unitarian Universalist Association asked us to not vote for this Business Resolution because of the severe financial impact to our Association that it would create. Though it is worth noting that no un-elected UUA staff commented either way, because they are forbidden from speaking for or against voteable General Assembly business in their employment contract.

The Business Resolution did not pass with 68.3% of the votes against, and 31.7% for. While the Resolution didn't pass, which will secure the Association's financial stability this year, I believe that these powerful words and actions shared by our young people will encourage our future leaders to address these divestment concerns. Watching this process was a good study for me in how sometimes even when you don't win, you do succeed in getting your message across. Our new UUA President is listening.

#### Our New President

Rev. Sofia Betancourt was elected to a six year term as the next Unitarian Universalist Association President, winning 95% of the votes. If you want to learn more about her, you can visit her campaign website: https://sofiabetancourt.com/

### **Actions of Immediate Witness**

Every year the Unitarian Universalist Association can choose up to three Actions of Immediate Witness statements to support, which encourage congregations to support social justice causes that connect to Unitarian Universalist Values. I'm sure you will be hearing more about these soon. This year they are:

- Protect the Dreamers, the Recipients of Deferred Action for Childhood Arrival (DACA) with a Pathway to Permanent Residence
- -Rise Up to Stop Cop City
- Organizing for Health Equity

What amuses me about this report that I'm making to you today, is that this is a LONG report, and I'm leaving so much out! General Assembly is a rich experience of learning, connection and democracy. Maybe next year you'll want to serve as a delegate? Next year's General Assembly will be 100% online, so cost will not be an obstacle!

#### **Kitchen Renovation Update**

And there was much rejoicing!

Here is good news: After long hours (months) of toil, the kitchen renovation is finished! Hooray!

We have new and refurbished cabinets, a fancy sink, and updated countertops. The food service area is now stain-proof so there's no more crying over spilt coffee. Lighting is improved with new LED fixtures. We also have new ranges and under-cabinet microwaves. The paint is fresh and so is the floor tile, including hallway, bathrooms, and fellowship space. The water heater is also new and more efficient.

To prevent further cold weather challenges, PEX piping is in place throughout the kitchen. Additionally, volunteers installed tons of insulation.

We extend a thank you to everyone involved with the recovery and restoration of the kitchen and adjacent spaces.

A hearty thank you in particular is sent to our main influencers, Michael Richards and Dave Kashdan for their energy, hard work, and generosity with their time and talents in bringing this to completion.

#### **July Treasury Report**

The financial summary for the fiscal year 2022/2023 is shown below. Our income was above the budgeted amount due to strong support of the auction and pledges. Our expenses were only 98% of the budgeted amount giving a surplus for the year of \$12,941. This surplus is critical for funding major spending that is not part of the annual budget. This year it was divided between the Capital Repairs fund (\$11,647) and the Capital Projects fund (\$1,294). Clearly the support of the congregation has us in a very strong financial position allowing necessary repairs to the church. These include replacing rotting boards on the old deck and replacing windows with rotting frames in the minister's and DRE's offices. We also supported four different charitable organizations through fifth Sunday collections and continued our support of Kitchen of Hope with donations of money and time.


### **LGBTIA Focus Group:**
