The Ten Principles of Email Communication

This last month I was teaching a Communication Skills class for an organization outside of our church and I came up with these principles of email communication. It occurred to me that they might be useful for us here as well. Enjoy!

- 1. Keep it Simple: People don't read long emails unless they are highly invested. If people see large blocks of text they may just opt to not read your email at all. I feel like long emails are a relic from a time when written communications took days or weeks to deliver, but that's not the case anymore. People can send emails back and forth when they need more clarification. You don't have to load your emails with every single detail.
- **2. Do not bury the lead:** What do you really want someone to take away from your email? Say that first. In the first sentence. And then say it again at the end. For example, if I'm wanting to recruit someone for a project I saw that upfront. "Can you help me with task xyz?" Then I will elaborate on what would be required. But I put the ask first, out of respect for my reader's time.
- **3. Express Gratitude as often as possible:** There's always something to be grateful for, and positive energy makes the world go 'round. Keep it brief, but say "thank you" for something related to what you're communicating about.
- **4. Separate out subjects into separate emails:** This is really just an elaboration of principle 1. But if you're asking a person (or worse, a group of people!) for several unrelated things, send them several emails with separate subject lines related to what you're looking for. Otherwise they may just register the first point and miss the others.
- **5. Make a specific ask at the ending:** Assuming your email has a reason to be sent in the first place, you're probably asking for participation or information. End your email with a specific ask for what you want: "please reply by {date} so we can plan" or "please let me know if you can help with this event by {date}"
- **6. Re-read your email with empathy before sending:** A little proofreading can go a long way, and can be especially effective if you put yourself in the shoes of those who you are emailing. Sometimes when you do this you can see something important that was missed.
- 7. Discern when email is the wrong medium: There are times, especially when things are conflicted, that an email will just not do. Sometimes people need to hear your tone of voice. Sometimes you need to read each others' body language. Sometimes it's tempting to send that email anyway because it gets the matter off your plate, but when a relationship needs to be centered, consider that email might not be the right way to communicate.

Likewise, important group decisions and controversial topics can turn into out of control email threads. This can be a source of tremendous stress, and can marginalize your team members that don't have the capacity or the time to continue to engage in this way. Have a meeting instead.

- **8. Do not abuse the Reply All function:** We've all been on the receiving end of long threads of Reply All messages. Really consider if everyone needs to hear your opinion before you "Reply All"
- **9. Do not leave people hanging:** Create reasonable expectations around when you will and will not be replying to emails. Set a goal for how often you will reply. And if you're going to be unavailable for a longer period of time, set up an Autoresponder message so that people know they aren't going to hear back from you for a while.
- 10. Cultivate a reputation for being a respecter of people's time: If you don't Spam people, don't copy them on unnecessary things, and follow the principles above, people are more likely to make time to read your emails.

Social Justice News and Initiatives

Environmental Focus Group:

This month, members of HVUUC are helping to make our local waterways safer and more beautiful places for people enjoying the outdoors by signing up as a community to reduce the flow of plastic, foam, and other trash from the South Holston River into the TN River. Removing litter from waterways protects fish, birds, and other wildlife from dangers of entrapment or accidental consumption of garbage. Thousands of pounds of trash are available for collection on the banks of the South Holston and we have a date to fill some bags!

We are participating with the Keep TN River Beautiful organization to make a difference to the health of the river and to deepen our Water Communion observance. On the afternoon following Water Communion, we will gather at Washington County Park and be taken by their boats to areas of the river bank most in need of care. Equipment is provided. Wear clothes that can be grubby and sturdy, closed shoes. You might want a water bottle, hand gel in your pocket, or hat/sunscreen. It feels a lot like work but work is always lighter when you share it with friends and takes on greater meaning as we experience it as a part of our Water Communion connection.

Advocating Democracy:

Our UU Principle state: "... the use of the democratic process within ... society at large." Over the last two weeks, the Tennessee State legislature has conducted themselves in a clearly NON-democratic fashion by establishing restrictive "rules" for the special session addressing gun violence in TN. For example, it limited speech to a narrow scope (thereby eliminating dialogue of the intended subject) and silenced duly-elected representatives of the citizens. September 10 at 6:00PM. Dr. Vance Shaw, FASAM, will be speaking about the best methods of treatment for addiction. After he speaks, Sullivan County Anti-Drug Coalition will provide Narcan training to stop opioid overdose and distribute it.

Narcan/Naloxone is a nasal spray medication that rapidly reverses an opioid overdose. One use of this medication can save a life while you wait for first responders to assist. The Sullivan County Anti-Drug Coalition will provide training on this life saving medication and distribute it to anyone who receives the training to keep at home.
