Dark and Light

Around the Spring Equinox we see a lot of metaphors involving "light" and "dark". Often, the story of the balance of light and dark is told in an over-simplified way: light represents that which is good, and dark represents that which is bad. We see it a lot in Unitarian Universalist chalice lightings. When Martin Luther King Jr says "Darkness cannot drive out darkness: only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate: only love can do that," he is equating darkness with hate and light with love. It's an ancient metaphor. In my imagination, I see our ancestors gathered around a campfire in the dark. The fire is protection from the scary things in the night that might eat them. The fire is warmth in the cold.



But in conversations amongst my Unitarian Universalist minister colleagues, there is a challenge to see how we can move away from this metaphor, or at least play with it. The language and metaphors we use can influence how we relate to the world in ways that we sometimes don't even recognize. If dark is a metaphor for hate and evil, and the bad guys in the old western movies always wear black hats, then what does that mean for a child who is told that they are "black." If light is a metaphor for goodness and love, and the good guys in the old western movies always wear white hats, then what does that mean for a child who is told that they are "white." How this metaphor may tie into white supremacy culture is one challenge. The irony is not lost on me that the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. used this metaphor in this way fifty years ago. But Unitarian Universalists of color today are asking us if we can use our imaginations in a different way now.

A perspective that sees the world as a polarity between "good" and "evil" is another reason that this metaphor is getting outdated. Polarities can tempt us to force people, causes or ideas into one camp or another, when in truth we are complicated beings and complicated movements that have helpful and less helpful aspects simultaneously. If one of the goals of human relationship is connection, then letting go of the good/evil polarity can create the possibility of connection where there once wasn't one.

It is an interesting, creative exercise to flip the script. Darkness is rich soil that produces healthy crops. Darkness is a mother's womb, creating new life. Darkness is eyes closed in meditation. Darkness is rest after a demanding day. Light is high-beams blinding you as you try to drive home safely. Light is the white cloaks of the Klu Klux Klan. My goal here isn't to preserve the duality of good and evil, but to play with how the metaphor can go another way. Flexibility with our symbols often creates new possibilities that we never considered.

In personal growth work, the metaphor of light and dark is used as well. The "light" is the part of the self that we know, see and accept. The "dark" is the part of ourselves that are still hidden and unknown, often because they represent something about ourselves that we fear or can't accept. Here the "light is good" and "dark is bad" metaphor also does us a disservice. How much stronger might we be, if we allow ourselves to be curious about what we don't yet know about ourselves, rather than afraid? How beneficial could it be for us to embrace the unknown?

In many Earth-Centered traditions, the Goddess is dark and the God is light, and both have their positive qualities and their less helpful qualities. In the Jewish mystical tradition of the Kabbalah, that which is most sacred and unknowable divides into a sphere of dark and a sphere of light, both of which are good and necessary to create the world. In Unitarian Universalism, we can find that which is most sacred to us in both the chalice light, and in the moment of quiet darkness that comes before the light. It is my hope, that we see that which is sacred in every part of our world, and in every part of our selves.

What's Happening in the RE Zone?

Pre K - 1st Grade

Change and Transformations

The 2nd—4th graders will be looking at Change and Transformations together this year. We will watch our own changes as we grow this year; those in a special tree and nature nearby and on earth; the big movements of our planet and galaxy, and changes that we can make as we work for social justice. Each lesson will be connected to one of our U.U. principles and it will include a story from children's literature, as well as activities and experiences. Kingsport Kitchen of Hope April 1

In the basement of the Full Gospel Mission on Sevier St in Kingsport, is a tiny kitchen staffed entirely by volunteers that feeds dinner 6 days a week to 100-130 people. Diners have ranged from infant to 88. For many of them, it's their only meal of the day. The church serves dinner at the Kitchen of Hope the first Monday of each month. How can you help? Glad you asked.

The menu changes monthly. Volunteers are needed to help cook, serve and clean up.

Set up/cooking: 1:00-3:30 Servers: 3:00-5:00 Cleaners: 4:45-6:00

The kitchen is quite small, so if you want to help, please contact the coordinator so we don't end up with too many cooks in the kitchen!

You can also help by donating food or money for food. Or if you'd like to bake cookies, cupcakes, or other desserts ahead of time (note: we cook for 150, so if it's too much, you could always split this with another baker)



The church sells prepaid shopping cards, in various denominations, in the Fellowship Hall after the service.

When you buy a card for \$100 from Food City or Ingles, this buys you \$100 worth of goods at that store, and the church makes 7%, which last year was about \$6000.
