## Congregational Meeting to Vote on the Search Committee

#### December 8th

The time to vote on the search committee to find a new called minister is almost here! However, the current Church bylaws do not align with current Unitarian Universalist Association recommendations to form this committee. In order to correct this, a special meeting is being called on December 8th to change the church bylaws regarding this single provision. A 35% quorum of church members is required to hold the meeting, and a simple majority vote of members in attendance will be binding. Your attendance and vote are very important!

Voting on the search committee nominees will take place directly after the bylaws change has been approved on December 8th. The votes will be tallied by the Board of Trustees (closed session) and the search committee members will be announced the following week on December 15th. Your participation in the democratic process of the Church is needed, and greatly appreciated!

## 8-week Our Whole Lives (OWL) for $K - 2^{nd}$

Beginning February 2, 2020, Holston Valley Unitarian Universalist Church will offer an 8-week Our Whole Lives (OWL) program during the regular religious education class time (Sundays 9:30-10:45am) for children in Kindergarten through 2nd grade. The secular OWL sexuality education curriculum has been reported by NPR as the best curriculum of its kind. Registration is required for participation. OWL at our church is self-funded, that is, it is not included in the annual Religious Education budget. This has allowed us to expand the OWL offerings from 7-9 grade OWL to OWL for all ages. We have calculated the true cost (including training, facilitator time, curricula, and materials and supplies) of the K-2 OWL experience and developed a system called "Tiered Pricing," explained at the end of this note. All OWL facilitators go through intensive training for each level they teach and must be certified by their trainers. We are lucky to have Shannon Beckett, Cindi Huss, Ann Livengood, Will Powell, Sarah Sanders, and Sarah White as facilitators for this program.

Classes will be held on:

- Jan. 18 9:30am-12pm (mandatory orientation—at least 1 guardian required AND children)
- Feb. 2 (guardians AND children)
- Feb. 9 (children only)
- Feb. 16 (children only)
- Feb. 23 (children only)
- Mar. 1 (children only)
- Mar. 8 (children only)
- Mar. 15 (children only)
- Apr. 5 (guardians AND children)

The OWL program nurtures and supports the three Rs of early childhood sexuality education—Respect, Relationships, and Responsibility—by helping children increase self-respect and respect for others, build relationships with members of all genders and with many kinds of families, and understand their responsibilities regarding their own health and that of others.

It helps children:

- Strengthen and support their sense of self and self-esteem.
- Recognize and appreciate their bodies as good and beautiful, private and their own.
- Gain understanding and accurate, age-appropriate information about human bodies and reproduction.
- Develop more effective communication skills.
- Learn to make decisions that respect themselves and others and that anticipate possible consequences.
- Learn about healthy habits and what to do when they don't feel safe or respected.

OWL engages families in open communication about life questions and reinforces guardians' role as their children's most important sexuality educators.

Our Whole Lives uses approaches that work. The curriculum is based on the Guidelines for Comprehensive Sexuality Education produced by the National Guidelines Task Force, a group of leading health, education, and sexuality professionals assembled by the Sexuality Information and Education Council of the U.S. (SIECUS). Although developed by two religious organizations, Our Whole Lives is a secular program that contains no religious references or doctrine.

#### Tiered pricing: Choose your fee

**Tier 1** (\$35) is a heavily subsidized rate which does not actually cover the true cost of Our Whole Lives. However, we want as many individuals as possible to attend, so we work to provide a subsidy through volunteer time and donors who believe OWL is important. Pay Tier 1 if this is appropriate for your family. **Tier 2** (\$55) is a partially subsidized rate. It offsets more of the true cost but not the full cost of OWL. Pay this if it is appropriate for your family.

**Tier 3** (\$90) covers the true cost of this OWL program. Pay this if it is appropriate for your family. Finally, for anyone who is unable to pay any registration fee, choose the **free option** during registration.

#### Kingsport Kitchen of Hope December 2

In the basement of the Full Gospel Mission on Sevier St in Kingsport, is a tiny kitchen staffed entirely by volunteers that feeds dinner 6 days a week to 100-130 people. Diners have ranged from infant to 88. For many of them, it's their only meal of the day. The church serves dinner at the Kitchen of Hope the first Monday of each month. How can you help? Glad you asked.

The menu changes monthly. Volunteers are needed to help cook, serve and clean up. Set up/cooking: 1:00-3:30 Servers: 3:00-5:00 Cleaners: 4:45-6:00

The kitchen is quite small, so if you want to help, please contact the coordinator so we don't end up with too many cooks in the kitchen!

You can also help by donating food or money for food. Or if you'd like to bake cookies, cupcakes, or other desserts ahead of time (note: we cook for 150, so if it's too much, you could always split this with another baker)

Like to plan ahead? We do this the first Monday of every month, so pencil us in with a big red pen!

## Get Your Grocery Store Shopping Cards!

The church sells prepaid shopping cards, in various denominations, in the Fellowship Hall after the service.

When you buy a card for \$100 from Food City or Ingles, this buys you \$100 worth of goods at that store, and the church makes 7%, which last year was about \$6000.

Register your Kroger customer card online, having our church as benefactor and we make about 5% every time you shop.

Just think of the results; if you just started to buy cards and you bought \$100 today, and then bought this amount every week for a year you would provide \$336 each year for the budget. We can all make a big difference if we unite behind this small effort!

#### 2020 Learning Tours New Community Project Peace through Justice • Care for Creation • Experiential Learning

NCP Learning Tours build community with our neighbors, explore important justice and environmental concerns, and offer opportunities to reflect on the connections between our world and their world. Expect basic but safe accommodations, an encounter with other cultures and ecosystems, good traveling companions, and plenty to think about. Trips are open to people of all ages, with every effort made to create experiences for folks from across the age and ability spectrum. Cost excludes airfare and visas, but includes all on-the-ground expenses.

**Nepal** (January 9 – 20, 2020) Leaders: Shakti Samuha; David Radcliff *Cost*: \$995 (\$895—student) (plus airfare to and from Kathmandu) Hosted by the anti-sex-trafficking group and NCP partner Shakti Samuha. Visit cultural and religious sites; meet women and girls NCP grants support for economic development and education; visit Chitwan National Park, home to preservation efforts for rhinos, elephants and Bengal tigers; take an overnight trek to an awe-inspiring view of the Annapurna Range (moderately strenuous, alternative transportation available). Accommodations in safe and clean hotels; possible overnight in village.

#### *Ecuadorian Amazon – Deep Jungle* (June 3 – 9) *Leaders*: Delio, David Radcliff, *Cost*: \$900 (\$825 student) (plus airfare to and from Quito) Head deep into the Amazon Rainforest to the "non-touristy" areas to experience one of the most biodiverse – and threatened – spots on earth. Explore the rainforest, guided by Siona shaman Delio; see monkeys, birds, pink dolphins, the ceiba tree ("Spirit Tree")—maybe even a jaguar; observe the impacts of oil drilling and ranching; visit indigenous Cofan, Siona, Kichwah, and Secopai native communities and NCP forest preservation efforts; accommodations in comfortable native-owned lodges while in the forest.

Diné (Navajo) Reservation, New Mexico (June 17 – 24) Leaders: Marlene Thomas, David Radcliff *Cost:* \$175 (student \$125) Experience the beauty of and challenges facing the land and people on the Diné reservation. Help with work projects in this native community northwest of Albuquerque; join with youth and elders to learn handcraft skills; learn about the history of the Diné, including boarding schools and The Long Walk. Explore current social issues, spiritual practices and the impacts of fracking; see local artists at work; visit nearby Chaco Culture NHP.

#### Dominican Republic (August 1 – 10) Leader: Tom Benevento Cost: \$525 (\$450 - students)

The Dominican Republic is best known for its emerald blue oceans, white sandy beaches and beautiful all inclusive resorts, but NCP will take you to a different side of that world. Live in a Batey community, learning about life for poor and marginalized immigrant Haitian/Dominican sugarcane workers who earn less than a dollar a day; explore environmental issues of the Caribbean region including deforestation, water scarcity, and the direct impacts of the climate crisis.

Denali/Kenai Fjords National Parks, Alaska (July 28 – August 6) Leader: David Radcliff Cost: \$825 (\$675 – student) (plus airfare to and from Anchorage) Camp at Savage River campground 15 miles inside the Park; hike along streams and up a nearby peak; see moose, grizzlies, Dall Sheep, a dogsled demonstration, and (if we're lucky) Denali—the Great One (highest peak in North America); spend a day doing a volunteer work project; explore environmental issues facing Alaska. In Seward on the SE coast take a day-long fjords cruise to observe whales, walruses, seabirds, and a glacier; visit a sea life center; stay (indoors!) in a cozy hostel.

Arctic Village, Alaska (August 7-15) Leaders: Charlie Swaney, David Radcliff Cost: \$875 (plus airfare to and from Fairbanks) Visit this north-of-the-Arctic Circle community—Gwich'in by birth, caribou by culture. Meet Arctic advocacy groups in Fairbanks: learn about the threat of drilling in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge and the impacts of global warming. Then travel by small plane (included in registration) to Arctic Village, where the group stays in homes. Several days camping on mountainside in sight of the Brooks Range, eat traditional foods, experience Gwich'in life and customs, maybe see migrating caribou. Spectacular!
