Hogwarts School of Magic and Fun July 15-19th!



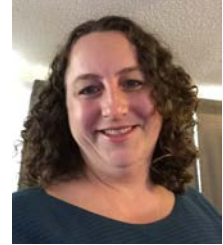

My Journey to Hogwarts

I'm feeling reflective. It's been a great internship and it's almost done. Thank you, each of you reading this, for the role you've played in this transformational year. This morning I was thinking about one of my first major experiences here at Holston Valley Unitarian Universalist Church: volunteering at Hogwarts Camp.



We as Unitarian Universalists have a long and fruitful history of using creative vehicles to share our values, especially when it comes to kids. We want to share our sense of justice and instill these future leaders with confidence in their own worth and dignity, and we want to do it using things that they already love.

There's Unitarian Universalist curriculum out there for using Star Wars to teach kids our values, with a strong focus on ethical decision making. A friend and I came up with our own program using a Star Trek-esque space exploration camp that taught our values with a focus on exploration, creativity and acceptance. And then there's the Hogwarts Camp, where the Harry Potter narrative of taking care of the underdog through accessing your personal courage lends itself beautifully to social justice work, and so many of our principles.

So before coming here I had heard of the Hogwarts Camp program that Unitarian Universalist congregations are doing throughout the nation when I was doing Religious Education in my home church. I had always wanted to do one, but lacked the resources and time to make it happen in the small lay-led Fellowship that I was serving at. When Sarah invited my daughter and I to participate here, even though I wasn't "on the clock" yet, I responded with an enthusiastic "yes!"

One of the amazing things about these camp experiences is that we don't just teach the kids Unitarian Universalist values through the class, but we also *show them* their worth and dignity in the way that we teach them. This is an embodiment of my goal to be the church that loves everybody.

And last summer we were given an incredible opportunity to live this out.

During day one, we adults noticed something that surprised us. There were kids with sensory discomforts that were getting overwhelmed. There were kids who had difficulty transitioning and would manifest their anxiety in extreme ways. There were kids who struggled with how to express their emotions, going from bottled up to explosive to bottled up all over again.

After the first day was over, the adult leaders of the camp gathered to debrief. We saw that more special needs were represented among the kids of camp than our registration paperwork indicated. Our Director of Religious Education told us that she was tired already and it was only Monday, but that she wanted this to be a place for all the kids, not just the "easy" ones, but that she didn't know how to do it.

We were at a tipping point: we could, as the adults with the power-above, use that power to avoid our discomfort and stick to our plan: wedging kids into boxes they didn't fit into. Or we could adapt, let their needs direct us, and use our power to support these kids.

We envisioned a camp that was fun, safe and loving: for every kid. We agreed that we didn't want to send anyone home. We were blessed to have a volunteer who had professional experience with several of the challenges that were being presented, and she shared her expertise. So we chose to eliminate some of our activities that created sensory and social challenges, and we modified others to fit the needs that had come up from the kids. We rearranged schedules and increased coverage. A few times I found myself sitting quietly with someone who was not feeling comfortable enough to participate, but willing to stay in the room. We offered acceptance and they blossomed.

As the week went on, younger children found the courage to share with their house that they were feeling left out, and the next thing we knew bigger kids were mentoring smaller kids: even holding hands and giving piggy back rides as we transitioned from activity to activity. Kids found safe spaces in classes to talk about how they experience and express their emotions: maybe in our acceptance they found some acceptance for each other and themselves. And of course, a lot of messes were made and a lot of fun was had.

Being the church that loves everybody is a practice. And every day, we are called to practice that love: love that is expressed through justice, and intentional about its power. We will be called to try new things as our vision and our needs come up and from the people that we are serving, even the littlest people among us.

It's not too late to volunteer for this summer's camp, so you can show these kids that they are loved and worthy. And it's not too late to get your kids registered. Kingsport Kitchen of Hope May 6

In the basement of the Full Gospel Mission on Sevier St in Kingsport, is a tiny kitchen staffed entirely by volunteers that feeds dinner 6 days a week to 100-130 people. Diners have ranged from infant to 88. For many of them, it's their only meal of the day. The church serves dinner at the Kitchen of Hope the first Monday of each month. How can you help? Glad you asked.

The menu changes monthly. Volunteers are needed to help cook, serve and clean up.

Set up/cooking: 1:00-3:30

Servers: 3:00-5:00

Cleaners: 4:45-6:00

The kitchen is quite small, so if you want to help, please contact the coordinator so we don't end up with too many cooks in the kitchen!

You can also help by donating food or money for food. Or if you'd like to bake cookies, cupcakes, or other desserts ahead of time (note: we cook for 150, so if it's too much, you could always split this with another baker)

Family Promise Network

Trauma Informed Care May 13

People often survive trauma that we are unaware of. And these people need support and understanding from those around them. Well-meaning people sometimes re-traumatize survivors, and trauma can affect the individual, families, friendships, work, and even communities.

In addition to the initial trauma, Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) such as abuse, neglect, and family dysfunction, can change brain development and responses to stress, and may lead to health consequences, including early death.

Whether you are clergy, a member of a pastoral care team, a teacher, a leader, or simply a compassionate person, it is likely you will encounter survivors daily. During this workshop we will learn how to create empowering, physically and emotionally safe spaces for survivors, particularly those who have survived ACEs.

Get Your Grocery Store Shopping Cards!

The church sells prepaid shopping cards, in various denominations, in the Fellowship Hall after the service.

When you buy a card for \$100 from Food City or Ingles, this buys you \$100 worth of goods at that store, and the church makes 7%, which last year was about \$6000.

Register your Kroger customer card online, having our church as benefactor and we make about 5% every time you shop.

Just think of the results; if you just started to buy cards and you bought \$100 today, and then bought this amount every week for a year you would provide \$336 each year for the budget. We can all make a big difference if we unite behind this small effort!
